Look at God

God is so good! **The Royal Tea**

for the Women's Campus was a major success on every side! The desire of my heart for this event was to bring Bethel Women's Campus alumni back together, and to celebrate the ladies who support this ministry. We wanted graduates and supporters alike to come together for fellowship and encouragement, and that desire was met! Many graduates, from the first graduating group to recent students, converged on Lenoir Presbyterian Church for fellowship. The event was also a fundraiser, and the generosity of those who chose to participate was overwhelming! We were flooded with toilet paper, paper towels, dry goods, and over \$6000 in monetary donations. We could not have had this event at all if not for the diligent work and direction of Cynthia and Stan Brown (Bethel Board member) who were our event coordinators. There are several other individuals who had a hand in making this event possible, and to each of them, I say a whole-hearted "thank you" for making a little idea turn into a big success.

The word that the Lord gave me to speak at our event was sovereignty. We know from our encounter with Esther that Mordecai indicated that Esther was where she was "for such a time as this." This story illustrates the sovereignty of God in a very poignant way. One little Hebrew girl was made queen of one of the most powerful empires of the day during the very time that the existence of the Jews as a people would be threatened. This is not a coincidence. God knew exactly who He was allowing to be placed in a position of authority. God chose for Esther to be where she was, and it was so. Esther could not pick her parents, her place of birth, or her position, but God saw fit to use these things to set her exactly where He wanted her for His purpose.

But Esther's story also shows us the significance of human choice. When confronted with the great evil of the day, Esther had two choices before her: to remain unknown and save herself or to stand in the gap for her people and face possible death. God can set us up for His plan for our lives, but we must have the courage to choose His path. In Esther 4:10-12, Esther tried to excuse herself from her destiny. She was afraid because she knew the law. Anyone who entered

the king's presence unannounced would be killed unless he spared them. The odds were not in her favor because she had not seen her husband for a month. We often look at things with natural eyes. We see the obstacle before we think of God's plan or purpose.

Esther nearly fell to this temptation, and it would have cost her dearly. But Mordecai sent her a message that included something that moved Esther to action: covenant. The book of Esther is conspicuous in Old Testament scripture for not mentioning God by name once. However, Mordecai alludes to covenant with God when he speaks in verse 14: "For if you remain completely silent at this time, relief and deliverance will arise for the Jews from another place." Mordecai knew that it was not God's will for the Jews to perish from the face of the earth. There were too many prophecies that had yet to be fulfilled. But he warns Esther that if she does not act, her unbelief will condemn her. Esther chooses to summon her courage and fast for three days. God grants her the strength to do what needs doing, and because of her choice, the Jews were saved.

The takeaway from this biblical account is that we have to trust God's sovereignty in order to act according to His will. Whether He has seen fit to place us in a position we desire or not, He is the one who is in control. Many of us stall instead of acting on things God has desired of us because of the "what if" fear. What if it doesn't work out the way I want it to? What if people don't approve? What if I fail? God did not call us to account for the "what ifs"; He called us to move on His word. We can trust that God is big enough, strong enough, faithful enough, and sovereign enough to bring His own will to pass. So what are we waiting for? Some of us are like Esther before her decision was made. Perhaps we need to draw away and seek God to be reminded that He is exactly who He says He is, and that He will do exactly what He says He will do.

I am thankful and praise God for His continued work at Bethel and for the calling on my life to be a part of it. To think that He could use an old wretched man like me is truly humbling.

Psalm 100:4 states that we must "Enter His gates with thanksgiving and His courts with praise. Give thanks to Him and praise His name" (CSB). I was reminded of something profound at Bethel's annual Bible Conference. Dr. Dave Kistler said that praising God is what we do for what He has done, and worshipping God is what we do for who He is. Thanking God and praising God are something that should be synonymous. They go hand in hand and should not be contingent on how we feel.

The fall season is upon us and with it comes the change of the weather, the leaves of the trees change into magnificent colors and, of course, Thanksgiving. Thanksgiving is a time where we reflect on things in life for which we are thankful. Many people will have family get-togethers and spend time with loved ones around a meal as an expression of their thanks for their family and friends. Praise music can be a catalyst for worship, but the heart of worship is sitting in amazement and awe of a holy God. Psalm 100:5 states "For Yahweh is good, and His love is eternal; His faithfulness endures through all generations" (CSB). We worship God for who He is. He is good! His love is eternal! His faithfulness endures through all generations!

How easy is it to worship God if we are not thanking and praising Him? We can sing a praise song and we can have good feelings flowing through our bodies but if we are not praising God, we are operating in emotionalism and that is dangerous ground because our emotions can be deceptive. Worshipping God is beyond our emotions and is not bound to the church building or only possible while singing a song of praise. Have you ever just sat down with no background noise or distractions and just sat at the feet of Jesus worshipping Him for who He is? If not, I encourage you to try it.

Jesus tells us in John 4:24 "God is Spirit, and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth" (CSB). Worship involves our personal awareness of the Holy Spirit and our need for God indwelling His people. God is not limited to space and time or bound to one place. He is found everywhere and found all the time and we can worship Him everywhere at any time. Worship must be done from a genuineness. You cannot fake worshipping God and one cannot worship God unless they are reborn of the Spirit. Part of our role as His creation is to worship Him but if we are not worshipping Him, then who or what are we worshipping?

As we enter this season of Thanksgiving let us not enter it lightly or casually. Let us thank and praise God for His many blessings. Let us praise Him for not giving us what we deserve. Let us cultivate a genuine desire to worship Him for who He is and not lose sight of His goodness and mercy in our lives everyday no matter the season.

Counseling Corner

Emotional Pain

Emotional pain is the norm. "Families are, with a few exceptions, dysfunctional....Families are rarely religious, and if they are, they are certainly dysfunctional." David Mills, "Living in the Land of Cain" in Touchstone: A Journal of Mere Christianity. (2006). Seventeen years later, multitudes of families are in the same condition, if not worse. David Mills writing of the Lambeth Conference of Anglican Bishops in 1920 on marriage, describes it as "an eloquence and directness that is in a word, lustrous: The fellowship between man and woman in marriage was the earliest which God gave to the human race... What our Lord adds about marriage is not given as new legislation, but as a declaration of God's original purpose. The man and his wife are no longer twain, but one flesh; and those whom God has joined together, man is not to put asunder....God will work, as those who wait for Him well know, the miracle by which two lives become one, yet so that each life became greater and better than it could alone."

Society having left this biblical truth for many years is experiencing the consequences of emotional pain. Many dysfunctional families are those who have left God as their portion. "We look for light, but there is darkness! For brightness, but we walk in blackness....We stumble at noonday as at twilight: We are as dead men in desolate places." (Isaiah 59:9-10)

King David experienced dysfunction but did not abandon God. "For I will be glad and rejoice in Your mercy, for You have considered my trouble." (Psalm 31:7) The depth of David's trouble is written in Psalm 31:9-13. "My eyes waste away with grief, yes my soul and my body. My life is spent with grief and my years with sighing. My strength fails because of my iniquity, and my bones waste away. I am a reproach among all my enemies, but especially among my neighbors, and repulsive to my acquaintances; and those who see me outside flee from me. I am forgotten like a dead man, out of mind; I am a broken vessel. For I hear the slander of many; fear is on every side."

David was full of emotional pain. He looked to God in his emotional pain. Consider (Psalm 31:1) "In You, O Lord, I put my trust." (Psalm 31:9) Have mercy on me, O Lord, for I am in trouble." (Psalm 31:14) "But as for me, I trust in You, O Lord; I say You are my God."

I recently re-read the story of a young girl named Dorie who was born into a dysfunctional family. She wrote of

her experience in the book, Dorie: The Girl Nobody Loved. As a child Dorie was rejected by her mother and placed in an orphanage experiencing beatings by the orphanage director. Her beatings and rejection would normally have left her as an emotionally angry and resentful adult. Her father also left her. In the orphanage one girl said to Dorie; "This is a place you go where nobody wants you." She finally found a family that took her to a home. They beat her. At thirteen years old a group of college students came to the orphanage with a Bible story saying that Jesus Christ died on the cross for you and God loves you. Dorie remained seated as others left. She said to God, "They said you love me. Nobody else does. If You want me you can have me!" She states that instantly she felt that God was beside her, in her. In fact, an unexpected peace settled over her. "This must be God." That night in her bed Dorie cried for joy. "I had found Somebody who loved me." A friendly matron who joined the orphanage staff, Irma Fremm, invited her to go to church and gave her a gift. It was a small black book. On it was stamped, The New Testament. Tears blinded her eyes. It was the first gift she had ever received. That black book was in her possession at all times. As she marked it and memorized scripture, it helped her to keep hope in the rest of the trials she experienced.

We are entering the holiday season. You will probably experience emotional pain. Remember God loves you though nobody else does. Ask Christ to save you from your sins. Read John chapter 3 of the Bible and ask God to show you His love for you. Keep your Bible with you. Read it, underline it, and memorize scripture that God puts on your heart. For King David and Dorie sought Him in troubled waters. Emotional pain did not trump the joy of the Lord. You can experience His comfort in the troubled waters of life. ".... Your mercy, O Lord, will hold me up. In the multitudes of my anxieties within me. Your comforts delight my soul." (Psalm 94:18-19) Trust in the Lord through it all. He loves you!
